### 28.0 Community and Stakeholder Consultation

#### 28.1 **Engagement Framework**

Powerlink is committed to effective and genuine engagement practices with landholders and other stakeholders. Powerlink's activities are guided by our Stakeholder Engagement Framework which is underpinned by the key principles of integrity, openness, responsiveness, accountability and inclusiveness. Our Community Engagement Strategy also underpins our engagement planning approach and commitments to ensure we remain focused on undertaking respectful and transparent engagement across all stages of our infrastructure lifecycle. These documents are available online<sup>4</sup>.

The aim of Powerlink's engagement process with landholders and other stakeholders is to:

- collaborate and partner with a range of key stakeholders to incorporate their advice and feedback during key stages of decision-making
- gather information to identify the proposed land acquisition approach and associated timeframes for delivery
- facilitate discussions with landholders to gain access to properties to complete the required environmental and technical studies which support information analysis and decision-making
- provide timely, relevant and meaningful information about the project, reflective of the scale and complexity of project activities
- ensure landholders and other stakeholders are aware of key project activities and how they can genuinely provide input within the scope of consultation processes to contribute to decisionmaking
- listen to and understand what landholders, other stakeholders and the broader local community value and actively consider how this can be taken into account when analysing alternatives and determining solutions
- provide feedback on and demonstrate where input from landholders, other stakeholders and the wider community has informed decision-making
- promote the project need and benefits to secure broad support for the Project
- monitor, understand and consider landholder sentiment towards the project, working alongside landholders to address potential concerns and aspirations they may have
- identify potential risks and management strategies which acknowledge feedback from landholders and other stakeholders.

#### 28.2 Landholders and other stakeholders

Powerlink has undertaken early and targeted consultation with relevant Federal. State and Local Governments stakeholders, elected representatives, industry groups and landholders as part of the Project. Engagement activity has been undertaken to help gain meaningful input into social, environmental and technical matters to be considered during the initial project development phase. These learnings will be used to inform the subsequent construction phase of the Project. For the purposes of this assessment report, 'landholders' refers to the leaseholders and owners of the property titles traversed by the Preferred Alignment. 'Stakeholders' refers to all other interested parties, including government bodies, industry groups, cultural heritage and native title parties. The identified key stakeholder categories are provided in Table 29-1.

## 28.3.1 General stakeholders

Powerlink has identified and categorised general stakeholders in accordance with an engagement framework from the International Association for Public Participation (IAP2), taking into account their role in decision-making processes (Figure 29-1). Powerlink has used this spectrum to guide the frequency, nature and scope of engagement carried out for the project. Table 29-3 provides an overview of the key stakeholders engaged and the associated type of engagement activities Powerlink has conducted with them for the Project to date.

Powerlink is committed to establishing and maintaining respectful and cooperative engagement of Traditional Owners (Native Title holders) and providing effective recognition, protection and conservation of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultural heritage. During the engagement processes, Powerlink has sought input from the relevant Native Title holder groups. Subsequent face-to-face meetings have also been held with each group to provide them with further information about the Project, seek early advice about any known constraints and understand each group's preferred engagement approach. Advice was also sought from the Department of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Partnerships Cultural Heritage Unit on any known local matters of interest. Powerlink will meet its Duty of Care under the *Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Act 2003* through the negotiation of formal agreements or Cultural Heritage Management Plans (CHMPs) with each of the relevant Aboriginal Parties (Native Title holders).

## 28.3.2 Landholders

Powerlink has a dedicated Landholder Relations team to engage with landholders on a regular and comprehensive basis. Two Landholder Relations representatives have been assigned by Powerlink to lead landholder engagement and be the primary contact for landholder interactions.

Central to landholder engagement activities is Powerlink's Land Access Protocol (LAP)<sup>7</sup>. This document outlines the guiding principles for land access which underpin Powerlink's relationship with landholders and access to, and use of, their land. The LAP supports open and transparent communication between Powerlink and landholders, prompts discussion and collaboration during the engagement processes, and fairly safeguards the interests of landholders while providing Powerlink with the access to land needed to meet its business requirements.

Table 29-5 summarises the key purpose of landholder engagement activities to date for the Project as well as the associated methods actioned. Methods of engagement were tailored to meet landholder preferences. Direct phone conversations and face-to-face meetings were generally preferred for key engagement activities. Email and phone contact were landholders' preferred methods for receiving information and follow-ups in response to their requests for further information.

Throughout the engagement, the top five topics most frequently raised have been:

- potential impacts on property operations
- biosecurity
- compensation
- potential impacts on existing infrastructure/topography
- co-location with Ergon Energy powerlines.

## 28.4 Consultation and Further Engagement

Powerlink is continuing its direct engagement activities with landholders and other stakeholders as part of the public consultation process for this assessment report.

Advertisements have recently been placed in local newspapers advising of the availability of the assessment report and the process to make a submission to the Minister for State Development, Infrastructure, Local Government and Planning. A copy of the document on USB has been mailed to all directly affected landholders and other key stakeholders and publicly displayed in local libraries, council offices and other places of assembly. Powerlink is also holding community information sessions in Mount Fox, Greenvale and the Kidston area.

The assessment report and public submissions will be assessed by the Department of State Development, Infrastructure, Local Government and Planning.

Ongoing engagement with landholders and other stakeholders remains a key focus during all phases of Powerlink projects. This ensures Powerlink has the opportunity to strengthen and leverage relationships with landholders and other stakeholders well into the future for the entire project lifecycle.
